Key information





- We are a school based sixth form.
- Our learning environment is slightly more formal than a college setting.
- Our spaces are often shared with students in years 7-11.
- Sixth form students can only leave site at lunchtime and from 2.20pm.
- We are a Catholic Salesian School.

Expectations

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- We are not an open access college. This means that students cannot come and go as they please throughout the day.
- We expect that students are on site for 8.40am for their identified coaching session and by 9am on any other day, even if they don't have a lesson period 1.
- Students are expected to swipe in with their ID badge and swipe out when they leave.
- Students can go off site at lunchtime but must return by 1.35pm.
- If students do not have a lesson period 3 then they are free to leave at 2.20pm.

Coaching



Every student will have the opportunity to meet with their group tutor at least twice across each half term.

Attendance



- Attending college regularly and being on time is an essential requirement for success.
- Students should aim to have at least 95% attendance if they are going to fulfil their potential at Sixth Form. Attendance has a big impact on future achievement.
- Students should only stay off school if they are very unwell.
- If they are unwell in the morning then please phone the main school reception number before 8.40am.
- If they are unwell during the day, then they should not leave without informing a member of the Sixth Form team.
- Punctuality to lessons is essential and all lateness will be recorded and monitored.

Self study



- Students should expect up to 2 pieces of set work to complete outside of lesson time each week.
- For each subject, students should be completing a minimum of 3 additional hours outside of lesson time on self study.
- Within their timetable, students have a number of periods of non-contact time which should be used effectively to carry out independent study.
- The Learning Resource Centre is available in the first instance.
- 'Homework' will be recorded on Class Charts.

- Free school meals provision continues in Sixth Form if a student is eligible. Proof of entitlement needs to be forwarded to the Finance office: finance@thornleigh.bolton.sch.uk
- **Bursary**: a sum of money that students can claim to support them in their studies. Students need to be eligible and make an application. Details on the Thornleigh website.

Food service

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- There is a service at breaktime and lunchtime.
- Lunchtime includes a selection of hot and cold options. If students have any specific dietary requirements then they can be catered for.
- School Gateway can be used to top up lunch money and pay for trips etc.



Appointments & driving lessons Sixth

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- Students should try as far as possible to arrange all medical/dental appointments outside of college hours.
- In the event that they need to have an appointment within college hours then parents should contact us in advance with the details.
- Driving lessons should NOT be booked within college hours. We will only authorise a driving test.



Assessment schedule



- Week beginning 18th September each subject will conduct an early **diagnostic assessment**. This will allow teachers to assess whether additional support is needed.
- Between September and January, each subject will conduct a minimum of 2 internal assessments. Teachers will provide feedback and set targets.

Assessment schedule



- Week beginning 8th January PPE 1. Revision/preparation over the Christmas break. Past paper questions under full exam conditions.
- Between January and June, each subject will conduct a minimum of 2 internal assessments. Teachers will provide feedback and set targets.
- Week beginning 17th June PPE 2. Past paper(s).
 Assessment of Year 12 content. Used to inform predicted grades. Opportunity for students to reflect.

LEVEL 2

Intermediate apprenticeships

Typical length

12-18 months

Entry requirements:

None or few

Qualifications obtained:

GCSE, BTEC or equivalent

Who's it for?

Mostly for 16-year-olds with limited or no academic qualifications.

LEVEL 3

Advanced apprenticeships

Typical length

12-24 months

Entry requirements:

Usually 5 GCSEs

Qualifications obtained:

A levels or equivalent

Who's it for?

Mostly for 16-year-olds with reasonable academic achievements but who don't want to study in sixth form.

LEVEL 4/5

Higher apprenticeships

Typical length

3-5 years

A Levels or equivalent

Qualifications obtained:

Higher national diploma / foundation degree

Who's it for?

Mostly for those who want to qualify for professional career paths without attending university or college. Sometimes referred to as 'school leaver' or 'non-graduate' programmes.

LEVEL 6/7

Degree apprenticeships

Typical length

3-7 years

Entry requirements:

At least 2 A Levels or equivalent

Qualifications obtained:

A BA or BSc degree or higher

Who's it for?

Mostly for those with excellent sixth form results that want to study for a degree or similar whilst working.




